Amendment 3

Voters of Georgia,

Politicians in Atlanta have been enticed by lobbyist representing large timber harvesting groups to lower their state average \$6.65 per acre property tax by as much as 50%.

How?

This year, politicians passed House Bill 85 and House Resolution 51 authorizing only specific timber owners pushing their agenda to have their property tax set by the State and not local governments removing any local enforcement or fairness.

What does this mean to you?

Special interest groups seeking favorable treatment from Atlanta and the State want nothing more than for you to pay their tax.

Can you do anything about it?

Yes, the good news is the Georgia Constitution requires your approval November 6th for this to take place. Constitutional Amendment 3, on the ballot November 6th gives you the opportunity to say if you want to pay large timber owners taxes or not.

*Vote **NO** November 6th on Amendment 3 if you do not want to pay the timber harvesting group's tax.*
